The Perfect Place

Plains, Georgia, population 558 as of 2020, is a small town about 150 miles south of Atlanta, just west of Americus. Plains is

President James (Jimmy) Carter, who served as our 39th president, from 1977-1980.

Just a few weeks ago, it was announced that President Carter, at



the age of 98, had entered hospice care. By definition, it means you are in the last six months of your expected life, and that you would like medical care that will keep you comfortable, but not prolong your life. Ideally, pain and suffering is reduced to enhance your quality of life.

It made me sad to see a picture of our former president. He looked frail and mortal. Not at all like I remember the pictures of him building homes while volunteering for **Habitat for Humanity** in his post-presidential years.

Most former presidents remain active in the political world in a major way, profiting from the climb to the top by serving on boards and giving advice, perhaps helping to influence future presidential choices.

But Jimmy Carter went home to Plains. If you've ever been there, you know that the truly small town is a reflection of President Carter and his family. Remember his brother Billy (passed in 1988), who was sort of a constant embarrassment? He is remembered here. But it's Jimmy Carter's town. Was then, is now, and probably always will be.

President Carter wasn't the most popular, or by historical measures, the most effective man during his White House term. The Iran hostage battle closed his presidency, and the Iranians insulted him by releasing the hostages soon after Ronald Reagan was sworn in.

But as the years rolled by, we got to know the president as a man. How many

times did we see and hear him in overalls, touting the homes he and other volunteers were building? Many great men are known by their words. Jimmy Carter will be a man remembered for his deeds, no matter what you thought of him as a president. More than any man who came before or after him in the Oval Office, he left office but didn't stop being a leader. He never had to **tell** us what he had done after leaving the White House, because we could **see** it.

Now, as he embarks on the last lap of an honorable journey, his accomplishments will be spoken of by many. But unlike many presidents, people will talk of his **entire life,** not just those in the White House. President Carter will be remembered more as a good and decent man, who lived his life in a way you might want your children or grandchildren to emulate.

I had an opportunity to visit Plains five years ago on a tour with one of our groups. We stayed in Americus, because Plains isn't really big enough to support a sizeable hotel. There's a National Park site, dedicated to the president (his library is in Atlanta). It feels like the place Jimmy Carter would have come from. This fall, we will visit once more.

I'm not from the south, and unlike **Clayton**, I don't feel a particular connection with that part of the country. But Plains is different. It's special and unique, **because** it's the home of Jimmy Carter, a man I will forever admire. It will be nice to once again visit the

town famous for a peanut statue, Billy Carter's Filling Station and a truly great man.

Clayton Place... Bits and Pieces

Hello Friends:

Back in 2017 my best friend Judy learned of a total solar eclipse that would be visible from parts of the West Coast. Salem,

Oregon - the city where her sister and brother-in-law live - was in the path of totality. She was set on going. Since I couldn't think of a better excuse I went along for the Now mind ride. you, I have nothing



against seeing an eclipse. It's just that I'm not much of a nature guy. I'd rather watch a movie or a Broadway show about an eclipse than drive 550 miles to see the real thing... or so I thought.

August 21 dawned bright and sunny. We were blessed that smoke from the incessant fires was blowing the other way for this one special day. About an hour before the Big Event folks started moving outdoors with lawn chairs and blankets, all donning a pair of the official eclipse-viewing glasses distributed by a local radio station as best I can recall. Slowly the sky started to change. I won't say "darken" because the conditions were not going to black, but rather to a golden amber that made everything glow with iridescence. I also noticed how guiet it had become. Complete and total silence. Not a bird chirped; not a dog barked; not a baby cried. Neighbors were rendered mute from shock, awe or both. All of humanity and nature was looking skyward to see what would happen next.

Eventually the skies went from brown to black as totality bathed the city. Street lights came on as they are programmed to do. Silence continued – we were all too stunned to speak for a few precious minutes. Then, ever so slowly, the amber glow - that mystical middle ground between dark and day - returned. As light increased, so did the volume of the city. Once again there was traffic, people, birds and dogs. The spell was broken, but not forgotten. It would never be forgotten.

So imagine my surprise and delight to learn last year that another total eclipse

would pass over North America on April 8, 2024. Since then I've been looking for a community or organization that is planning a celebration suitable for a tour group. I've found not one, but two options!

Arkansas is the first option. Remember the streetlights I mentioned in Salem? Lesson learned: View a total eclipse in the country away from city lights if possible. We'll fly to Little Rock and see all the sights - Clinton Presidential Library, Central High School, State Capitol. On April 8 we'll head out of town to a winery and view the spectacle from there in the company of other tour groups from around the nation. After a few days in Little Rock we'll depart to the west visiting Hot Springs and Ft. Smith en route to Bentonville, known as the home of Walmart, but renowned for the Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art, among the newest and finest in the country. This small community in northwest Arkansas has become a bastion for collectors and creators of American art in any number of genres. It may have started as a dime store town, but oh what it has become! From here we continue west into Oklahoma, paying tribute to Will Rogers as we pass through his home town of Claremore, en route to Tulsa and our awaiting flight home.

Texas is the second option. The community of Grapevine, located smack dab between Dallas and Ft. Worth and home to DFW airport, is offering a full-day city-wide festival with multiple entertainment stages and vintage train rides. Before and after the eclipse we will see the Metroplex from top to bottom visiting such iconic sites as JFK's grassy knoll and The Sixth Floor Museum in the old Texas School Book Depository in Dallas. The Ft. Worth Stockyards are as otherworldly as you can get. Though geographically close to the skyscrapers of Dallas, in Ft. Worth they have daily cattle drives and men still hitch their horses on posts outside saloons! Perhaps we keep the tour short and close to DFW. Perhaps we expand it to include other areas of this dynamic state that is even bigger than California... by over 5000 square miles!

Now it's time to cast your vote. Kindly write res@sportsleisure.com. In the subject line type just one word - ARKANSAS or TEXAS. In the e-mail be sure to give us your name and also anything/place you specifically want to see whether mentioned herein or not. In doing so you'll be putting your name on the Priority Notification List for this tour. When the tour takes shape and is ready to receive reservations, everyone will be notified regardless of which state you selected.

Paper Tickets – we have to beg/ pay for them/pick up at will call

Getting individual tickets for admission to theaters, ballparks, etc., has become a huge pain in the butt. With the transition to tickets on phones, every venue wants to go that route. Only problem is, not everyone has a cell phone which is a smart phone.

So in many cases, we have to pick up physical tickets at a Will Call window, pay to have them printed or jump through some other hoop(s) to get tickets. A few places are flexible, most are not. We are just sharing this information so you understand the delays in getting inside at some events.

40# limit on bags

Airlines place a 50# limit on checked bags. If you've ever filled a suitcase to that 50# limit and then tried to move it, you know it's a lot of weight. A number of years ago, *Sports Leisure* placed a **40# limit on checked bags**.

Why would we do that? Because a variety of people have to move your bag during a trip, and at least one of them is a member of our staff. In addition you have skycaps and bellmen and bus drivers who move your bag. The risk of injury is there all the time.

So we ask your help. We are going back to enforcing a 40# limit on checked bags on the outbound portion of your trip from Sacramento. We have purchased a scale to weigh your bags at the airport. Those bags

weighing over 40# will not be accepted for travel.

Here's a way to know is your bag is overweight. If your scale at home won't weigh your bag, get on the scale without the bag and note your weight. Now, pick up the bag and stand on the scale. Now you have the weight for you **and** your bag. Simply subtract your weight and you have the weight of the bag.

You are also allowed to bring a carry on bag. We allow those bags to be as large as a standard airline carry on, and they can weigh up to 25#. **Please know that we are serious about enforcing this limit.** If you have any questions or concerns about the 40# bag limit, please call the office.

- You never appreciate what you have until it's gone. Toilet paper is a good example.



Received the recent newsletter update by mail. I understand your going to an online publication. Everyone is doing that. But I'm one of those people who is old school and I like having a hard copy to hold in my hands. My brain just works better that way. I don't mind paying for the privilege, I just hope you continue to offer that option.

Ed. Note: The advantages of an e-mailed newsletter are many. They get to travelers the same day they are sent. Last minute changes can be made to copy right up until the moment they are sent. Tours can be added to the list or updated at the last minute. (Under the old system, the copy was finalized and sent to the printer, and then mailed 5-7 days later, then delivered to you.) We waited many years to make this change. The world has moved on, and we need to move with it. There is also a huge cost saving involved with e-mailing the newsletter. More efficient, costs less...perhaps you can see why we are moving this way.

By the way, your editor is also a "hold a copy in my hands" sort of guy. Slowly, over time, I've realized the online copy is easier to access anytime I want and the information is more up to date.

Right now, a printed copy is free. Starting in August, we will ask those wishing a hard copy to pay \$10 a year to receive one. Keep in mind the mailed copies will always be 3-5 days BEHIND the online edition. Don't miss out on a trip because you are waiting to hold it in your hand.

So now I have to pay \$10 for the privilege of buying things from your company? No thanks. Keep your crap and I'll buy my travel from someone who doesn't charge me to find out what they are offering.

Ed. Note: There are two sides to every story. Just to be clear, the online publication is still free. It's the printed copy that is soon coming with a price.

Lucille L writes:

Can you explain breakfasts in hotels on the road. I notice you almost always include breakfast, except in some big cities. Wondering what the reason is behind that? Also, I notice in the itineraries, breakfast is something indicated by a B, which I assume means breakfast. Sometimes I see FB. Can you explain the difference?

Ed. Note: Lucille, you actually missed one. An included breakfast on tour is indicated in one of three ways:

ECB - Expanded Continental Breakfast - more than just the regular pastry, juice and coffee that designates a continental breakfast. An ECB will have more choices,

often offered as a buffet, but may be limited on protein/breakfast meats.

B – This indicates something bigger than an expanded continental, but may still offer a limited menu. Could be plated or a buffet.

FB – This is the one you see most. FB tells you there is a wide choice of menu, or a full buffet, with eggs, meats and possibly other entrée choices (pancakes, French toast, etc.).

As a policy, we include breakfast on tour at most hotels. You are very observant to note it isn't included in some of the bigger (and generally expensive) destinations.

Here's the reason. If we feel what the hotel is charging for breakfast doesn't represent value to you, the traveler, we do not include it. If the Marriott in Times Square needs to get \$45 for breakfast, we feel we should leave it up to you. Coffee and a bagel is going to be a lot less than \$45 and there are lots of choices right outside the front door. The breakfast buffet at that hotel, including tax and gratuity, is going to be around that \$45 price. You can still have it, you just have a choice. Again, it's all about value. When the price leaves value behind, and there are other options, we leave the decision up to you. When we can get breakfast as part of the room rate, or it can be added at a discounted rate, we are right there. Hope that explains things a little better, both the when breakfast is included and what the different designations mean.




1. From the **Sports Leisure** office (our departure point) to Mammoth is roughly a 5-hour journey. On the way to Mammoth, we'll detour into the ghost town of Bodie.

Bodie State Historic Park is a genuine California gold-mining ghost town. Visitors can walk down the deserted streets of a town that once had a population of nearly 10,000 people. The town is named for Waterman S. Body (William Bodey), who had discovered small amounts of gold in hills north of Mono Lake. People flocked to Bodie and transformed it from a town of a few dozen to a boomtown. Only a small part of the town survives. Interiors remain as they were left and stocked with goods. Designated as a National Historic Site and a State Historic Park in 1962, the remains of Bodie are being preserved in a state of "arrested decay". Today this once thriving mining camp is visited by tourists, howling winds and an occasional ghost.

Arrive in Mammoth in early evening. A long but scenic and educational day of travel. Dinner, featuring local barbeque, is included at the lodge tonight. **(L,D)**

2.-3. Two, day sightseeing trips highlight your stay. The first includes a visit to Mono Lake. Mono Lake is an ancient saline lake located at the eastern edge of the Sierra Nevada in California. Home to trillions of brine shrimp, millions of birds, and world-famous tufa towers, its tributary streams also supply water to Los Angeles, nearly 350 miles to the south. It's one of the most unusual lakes in the world. Your visit includes a guided walk, a stop at the visitors center and lunch in nearby Lee Vining.

On the return trip to Mammoth, detour onto the June Lakes Loop. Also a ski area in winter, it's a great place for an afternoon break. The following day journey to Convict



As part of our commitment to helping you select the right tour for your interests and physical abilities, check out the Activity Meter for each tour to get a feel for how it matches your interests, energy and fitness. It's important to note that more than one level may apply to a tour. For example, some will enjoy a visit to a national park by spending time in the visitor's center and taking a seat with a view. Others might prefer to hike on a nature trail. Same destination, same tour, two different levels of activity.

The letter abbreviations for each departure can be found in the Table of Contents listing for the tour. Where you see two letters, that indicates the ability to add activities or do optional things which increase the amount of physical activity (standing, walking, climbing stairs, etc.). The meter is a guideline. It is impossible to predict every situation on tour, since conditions may change before or during a trip which require itinerary adjustments.

Leisurely – A tour that can be enjoyed by all. A minimal amount of required walking on city streets or generally level surfaces, with few stairs. A theater day trip might be an example.

Moderate – A tour with some walking activities, and standing/strolling at attractions and museums and possibly some stair climbing. A daytrip to the ballpark or a short regional trip (Monterey, CA Coast) might be examples. A moderate trip could include air transportation and navigating through airports.

Active – A tour which includes longer walks (3-5 city blocks). Shorter walks could be on uneven surfaces. Days could be longer (including longer travel days with layovers). Some of the trips could be at high altitudes.

This would be the level for most of our longer distance domestic and Canadian tours, the minimum level for an overseas international tour. Tours which mention the ability to walk 3-5 city blocks **in a timely fashion** a couple of times a day fit into this category, as would most of our national park tours. You could find a flight of stairs without handrails. A tour with a seaplane or jeep ride, and the ability to climb into the plane/ jeep, would be found in this category. Longer rail tours fit in this category.

Energetic – A tour with an accent on opportunities for walking and other physical activities. Many overseas tours would fit in this category. Long plane flights, perhaps standing or walking longer distances. You might have to climb into a boat, carriage or train. If you need wheelchair assistance at the airport or other places, you should not consider a tour on this level.

Challenging – Tours like these are designed with daily physical activities like hiking and other vigorous activities and can be great travel experiences, but they are not typical of *Sports Leisure Vacations* trips.

Lake. As you might guess, there's a story here. Nearby Crowley Lake also provides some photo opportunities. Back in town, there's a short visit to the ski resort area and Devil's Postpile Nat'l Monumnet, then some free time to relax or browse the modest shops in town. (2FB,2L,2D)

4. The return trip home is direct, with just rest and lunch stops en route, arriving in late afternoon. (FB,L)

3. Begin your exploration of Athens at the Acropolis, the architectural masterpiece of the ancient world. There you'll see the majestic Parthenon and the Acropolis Museum. Visit the Panathenaic Stadium where the first Olympic Games of modern times were held in 1896. Take a walk through Plaka, the oldest section of the city, to the Monastiraki Flea Market. This lively area of shops, stalls and eateries is a dream-cometrue for lovers of fun. food and fashion. Here you'll dive into mouth-watering Athenian markets where you can indulge yourselves with local treats including koulouri, donuts with honey, ice cream and kabobs. (FB,L)

- 4. Depart Athens by the coastal road of Attica towards Mycenae, the Homeric city of Atreides - the city "rich in gold" of the ancient poets. Visit the Lion's Gate, the Cyclopean Walls and the Royal Tombs. Leave for Epidauros and visit the 4th Century BC theatre famous for its astonishing acoustics. Amalia Hotel Olympia (FB,D)
- 5. Olympia was one of the most sacred and glorious sanctuaries of the ancient world. Though only the foundations of many of its structures remain, it is still one of the most evocative of Greece's archaeological sites. Capturing all the spirit of the Olympic Games, this is the place where the Olympic flame is lit in commemoration of the Games that originated and were held here every four years for ten centuries. The Altis (or Sacred Precinct of Zeus) is a district dominated by the ruins of the 5th Century BC temple dedicated to the King of the Gods. Passing through a stone archway you enter the ancient stadium, once with a capacity of more than 45,000 spectators. The mind boggles at being able to line up on the track just as the finest athletes in the land did thousands of years ago. Amalia Hotel Delphi (FB,D)
- 6. At the Delphi archaeological site on the slopes of Mount Parnassus lie the ruins of the Sanctuary of Apollo Pythius. You will be astonished by the Treasury of the Athenians, the Theatre, the Stadium and the Museum with ancient statues on display including Antinoos, the famous athlete Aghias and the unique bronze Charioteer dated from 475 BC. Continue to Kalambaka for the night, passing through the fertile planes of Thessaly on the way. Grand Meteora Hotel Kalambaka (FB,D)
- 7. The UNESCO World Heritage site of Meteora is home to more than 20 rock monasteries, either perched precariously atop towering sandstone cliffs or built into naturally formed caves. Continue with a visit to the Mushroom and National History Museum (not kidding), followed by truffle

hunting expedition in the nearby forest. Lunch features a mushroom product tasting with a truffle spaghetti as the main course. On the return to Athens you will have the opportunity to stop at the historic Battlefield of Thermopylae to see the Sacred Hill where Leonidas and the 300 Spartans died in the famous battle of Thermopylae in 480 BC. The story was brought to modern audiences in the movies "300" and "300: Rise of an Empire." Royal Olympic Hotel (FB,L)

8. Early up and out for the 5-hour high speed catamaran ferry to magical Santorini. On a guided island tour visit the traditional village of Pyrgos and stop at the Monastery of Profitis Elias, the highest spot on the island. 
