After this Issue, newsletters go online for most members

For many years, we have anticipated the time when such an overwhelming percentage of our members have the ability and knowledge to communicate with us online, we would be able to streamline our newsletters. We believe that time is now.

Ten years ago, 20% of our travelers didn't have an email account. Today, that percentage is down to less than 2%. We regularly watch many of you use your iPhones to check email, weather, directions and all sorts of things.

Starting with the next edition, newsletters will be delivered by email. We will send you a link to the publication online. We will still print a publication twice a year, after the **Spring Tour Preview** (which was held May 14th) and a full tour catalog after our annual **Tour Preview Day** (August 27th this year).

Distributing the newsletters by email will bring a number of benefits. First is

timeliness. Now, the printing and mailing process takes up to two weeks. With the computerized version of the newsletter, we will be able to add/update the schedule literally until the day we send it out. There will be considerable cost savings to us, with less printing and mailing. It will also be more earth-friendly, one of our company goals. Less wasted materials.

Can you still get a printed edition of *The Traveler* newsletter?

For now, the answer is **YES, YOU CAN GET A PRINTED NEWSLETTER.** We will mail one at no charge to Travel Club Members who request one. **Call us with your request today!** We will send you a newsletter by regular mail. One note – we will mail a copy machine created newsletter to you 1-2 days before the regular newsletter is posted online. When you receive the mailed copy will be up to the Post Office.

Will there be more frequent newsletter-style updates?

Absolutely. Because of the simplicity of creating/sending an update, we will be able to offer trips, especially entertainment-based day trips, we cannot offer now.

Despite the overwhelming number of members looking for this change, it's not a decision we make lightly. We mentioned above, we still have members without computer-communications. Many of these are long time travelers, and we really don't want to leave them behind. For now, we will accommodate them with a printed copy and send the rest of you an email link to the online edition at www.sportsleisure.com. The first online update will come in mid-July, offering you the chance to register for **Tour Preview Day on August 27th.**

43 years, 56,000 Members: What a Journey!

The numbers alone are pretty impressive. New memberships came to a virtual standstill during two years of pandemic, yet, we have still issued nearly 56,000 membership cards since 1979. To give you an idea, the 2020 population of El Dorado Hills was 47,000. So enough Travel Club Members to fill a medium-sized city.



From trips to Giants baseball games, to the popular-at-the-time casino day trips to Reno and Tahoe, the company was driven by the ideas of the travelers.

"Did you ever think of going to Hearst Castle?" "I've never been to Yosemite, ever think of going there?" "I've always wanted to ride **The Skunk Train** in Fort Bragg."

Those modest first ideas led to the concept of a tour company that went **everywhere**. By our third year, we had **Australia** and a cruise around **Tahiti** on the schedule. A chance comment from a traveler about the possibility of staying in a Marriott hotel led to us setting our quality sights a little higher. You told us what you liked, and we put your wishes into our product. Or should we say, your parents and older generation friends and neighbors told us what they wanted...

Fast forwarding to today, your input still drives the company. Those evaluations you complete play a big role. I get to see many of you in person on tours I escort throughout the year. Ditto for **Clayton**. (More on Clayton in a minute.) You tell me in person what worked and what didn't. Often times I see success (or failure) first hand. At Preview Day, you will slip me a piece of paper with a reference to a destination you want to visit, or you send an email.

All of that input is extremely valuable. Between your input and things like **Priority Lists**, we are able to offer you trips to places on your wish list. As a small company, we

need to get it right. Listening to you helps make that happen.

Our trips are a little longer, with a little more free time, a little more upscale, cost a little more than others, and give you a chance to travel with a local company. I think that's important, the local company thing.

There aren't many independent tour operators like ourselves. We don't employ "artificial intelligence" on our phones. We answer them (ok, after hours there is a recording). We talk to our travelers. Customer service still has not only a presence, but a value, at our company.

Perhaps that makes us "old school." Some will likely consider us a "dying breed." I have no issue with those labels. Travelers who follow will be used to websites and punching buttons on their phones and talking to people who aren't actually there. Those systems will probably work for them.

Perhaps the thing of most value after four plus decades of travel are the people. When you stop for just a second to remember some of the people who have been a part of this dream, it is totally amazing. Many, heck most of them, are gone now. But the stories and the memories they created will live on forever. Don't believe me... just wind me up someday and listen to the stories pour out.

That first **Tahiti** cruise, with **seven ladies** in tow, makes the all-time list. There have been journeys on **Route 66** and numerous trips to Broadway. There have been big surprises in small places, like the visit to **Plains, Georgia**, hometown of Jimmy Carter (really need to get that on the schedule again). The annual visit to Key West and all the characters there who make our trips so much fun definitely make the "all-time" list!

This Christmas, our mystery tour will return to one of my all-time favorite places (I'll tell you in January where it is), and I can't wait for our next big baseball tour next year to the Hall of Fame.

Indeed, our business has become much, much tougher, and a bit less *fun* during the pandemic, but perhaps **normal** will return someday soon. In the meantime, your patience and loyalty keep us going. More

than anything, after so many years, it's still all about the people. You make it all possible.

At the Spring Preview Day in May, I announced something which was long overdue. For many years, **Clayton** has held the role of **Vice-President** here at **Sports Leisure**. The Fine Print

We don't like to read the fine print. Whether it's a large transaction or small, the acquisition of a new appliance or houseplant, signing up to provide volunteer service or join a new organization, and heaven forbid if you're buying a new car or house, we are inundated with pages upon pages of information – directions and descriptions; warnings and disclaimers. A friend gave me a small battery-operated light designed to come on when you enter the bathroom at night. It's motion-activated and provides a soft glow – just enough to help me do my business, but not enough to pull me from my sleepy state. I was surprised to find a four-page instruction manual. I actually read it, curious to learn how such a small device could command so much fine print. There was a whole section on avoiding potentially fatal electric shock. Electric shock!?!?! It's a tiny light using one AA battery! But I will confess I thought about it when I went into the bathroom that evening.

At **Sports Leisure Vacations** we have a small, but important document containing the bulk of our fine print. It comes your way tucked in with every multi-day tour reservation in the form of the **Special Vacation Notes and Information** brochure.



In May we revised this document for the first time since 2019. I want to now bring a few important changes to your attention.

Cancellations without penalty: We have long prided ourselves on our policy that you could cancel a tour for any reason up to 60 days before the departure and receive a full refund including the price of Cancellation Protection (CP). We were able to sustain this rare-in-the-industry policy because most of our suppliers did not need a firm commitment on numbers until 30 or 45 days out. Well, that was then and this is now. Today nearly all our suppliers require us to confirm our numbers and pay in full at 60 days out. Clearly we need some time to react to your cancellation, especially if the tour planner is on the road. So we've rolled all of our deadlines forward by 10 days. You must now advise us of a cancellation (plus any other special requests including airline upgrades) 70 days prior to the departure. Inside 70 days the provisions of CP (or Travel Insurance on international vacations) apply.

Door-to-door service changes: Charges for home pick-up and return are calculated on a number of factors. Miles are certainly one of them, but also the time it takes to reach a location. As our city continues to grow and congestion increases, so does the time it takes to serve especially the outlying areas, resulting in a few changes to our service boundaries. Travelers in Galt and Auburn (95602)/Lake of the Pines are now OUTSIDE the service area. You may

still utilize the service, but it will come with a surcharge. (Those living in Auburn 95603 remain inside the service boundary with no additional fee.)

Those electing to provide your own transportation to the airport or meeting point will now receive a \$100/traveler reduction on the cost of the vacation.

The pandemic and other sad realities of our times: In these most peculiar of times I feel we must be very clear about what CP covers and what it doesn't. CP does not include coverage against any act of war, domestic terrorism, weather, pandemics or fear of same. Should a group become stranded due to any of these factors, each traveler must accept and pay the additional costs. Should a traveler fall ill during a tour (with COVID or any other ailment) and be separated from the group, additional costs for medical attention, recuperation and quarantine is the responsibility of the traveler. This would be viewed as Vacation Interruption, and yes, there's a section on that in the brochure. The limit of **Sports Leisure's** liability is getting the traveler (and their companion if applicable) back to their departure city. That said you will not be alone. Our road and office staff, along with our network of suppliers and friends, have your back. We are there to help you to the fullest extent of our ability, but we cannot suffer the additional expenses that accrue in such a situation.

That's it. Not my usual **Clayton Place**, but extremely important information nonetheless. The next time you make a reservation and that yellow brochure falls out of the envelope, how about doing me a favor. Will you give our fine print a read? It won't help you avoid electric shock, but I promise it will make you a more informed traveler. I thank you in advance for your time!

Generally, all dimes, quarters and half dollars minted 1964 and before have a value. For half dollars from 1965-70 also are worth more than 50 cents. For pennies and nickels, generally coins before 1940 have value. All silver dollars minted 1935 or before are worth having appraised. Many of the items the mint has issued from 1936-present have value. Proof sets, mint sets, various commemorative coins, some are worth only a few dollars, but some much more. There is no charge for appraisals for Travel Club Members and their referrals.

The Generosity of Sports Leisure Travelers

At our recent **Holiday Preview Day** at the KVIE Studios, we offered attendees the opportunity to donate to humanitarian efforts in **Ukraine**, through the efforts of a local Slovic church. It should be noted many of our car drivers are from Ukraine, and in fact for some, this is their church.

The church gathered medical and non-perishable food items and shipped them in containers overseas. The shipping costs were high and that created a need to raise money. (You may have seen the open letter in the last newsletter.) **On Preview Day alone, you contributed over \$6,000.** This doesn't count many individual donations. We proudly covered the cost of an entire shipping container of much needed supplies. Eugene Ivanilov, one of our drivers who appeared at the afternoon session, said *"We cannot thank you enough for your kindness and generosity. It means a lot to us and the people in our country."*

COVID is Far From Over, But Here's a Solid Idea

As a society, we have decided to throw caution to the wind when it comes to the pandemic. Masks, hand washing, etc., is out of vogue. The current strain of COVID is very contagious. The good news is, most people who are vaccinated and boosted have only mild illness if they catch it.

The challenge comes if you catch it away from home, like when you are traveling. That requires protocols which separate you from the group, and keep you that way for the 5-7 days it generally takes for the virus to run its course. We have procedures to follow, but of course they require you to remain behind from the group, for the safety of others.

No one wants to deal with that situation. So what does a traveler do? Friend of **The Travel Guys**, USA Today and Forbes Magazine Travel Editor and noted consumer advocate **Chris Elliott** has a suggestion. **Consider testing for COVID BEFORE you travel.** My doctor adds, especially if you notice one or more of the common symptoms (*really* runny nose, hacking cough, sore throat, super tired). Sure, it could just be a cold or the common flu, but if you had something or things from that list, wouldn't it make sense to test at home, **before you departed?** Better perhaps, to be stuck at home than stuck **away** from home. Plus, your fellow travelers would be very grateful for your sense of responsibility to others.

The government has made this easy. They are once again offering 8 home tests per address for **free**. Go to www.covid.gov/tests and order yours. The day before your trip departs, you give yourself the home test.

Based on recent experience, we believe if travelers were pre-testing, we may have been able to avoid a couple of recent situations where the virus popped up during or after a trip. It's certainly an idea with some merit.

Our Vaccination/Boosted Policy Remains in Place

In order to participate in any **Sports Leisure Vacations** trip or activity, you

must be both vaccinated **and** boosted (once). (The CDC strongly recommends if your last booster was more than 6 months ago, you consider a second shot.) Proof of vaccination is required at the first point of contact (airport, motorcoach, etc.). You can show your card, have it on your phone, whatever works for you will work for us. That way, **everyone** who travels with us knows we are all, together, making an effort to protect not only ourselves, but each other.

Upgrades in the Sky, Special Needs – Please Request Well in Advance

Upgrading your air ticket – If you wish to add upgraded economy seats, or try to use your miles to purchase/upgrade a ticket, make sure you make that request **when you make your reservation or payment.** Airlines are very stingy with how many of those are available. If you wait until a few weeks before departure, you will likely be disappointed. Call the office and ask for **Michael**. Currently, he is in Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, 9am – 3:30pm.

If you **are bringing a walker or other assistive device in the car which picks you up**, we must know in advance. Wheelchair assistance at the airport can be requested on departure day.

Fuel Surcharges

They are a reality. As you can experience by filling up at or just driving by a service station, gas and diesel prices have soared. It's one reason airfares have climbed and stayed high. Motorcoach companies are having to pass on the higher fuel prices through surcharges. Recently, they have reached as much as 10% of the total coach price, or about \$100-\$150 a day. This translates to about \$3-\$6 per passenger per day on tour.

Just a heads up, so you won't be surprised when you are asked for a little more before departure. These are legitimate, additional charges and when fuel prices come down, we promise the surcharges will come down with them.

ACTIVITY METER



As part of our commitment to helping you select the right tour for your interests and physical abilities, check out the Activity Meter for each tour to get a feel for how it matches your interests, energy and fitness. It's important to note that more than one level may apply to a tour. For example, some will enjoy a visit to a national park by spending time in the visitor's center and taking a seat with a view. Others might prefer to hike on a nature trail. Same destination, same tour, two different levels of activity.

The letter abbreviations for each departure can be found in the Table of Contents listing for the tour. Where you see two letters, that indicates the ability to add activities or do optional things which increase the amount of physical activity (standing, walking, climbing stairs, etc.). The meter is a guideline. It is impossible to predict every situation on tour, since conditions may change before or during a trip which require itinerary adjustments.

L Leisurely – A tour that can be enjoyed by all. A minimal amount of required walking on city streets or generally level surfaces, with few stairs. A theater day trip might be an example.

M Moderate – A tour with some walking activities, and standing/strolling at attractions and museums and possibly some stair climbing. A daytrip to the ballpark or a short regional trip (Monterey, CA Coast) might be examples. A moderate trip could include air transportation and navigating through airports.

A Active – A tour which includes longer walks (3-5 city blocks). Shorter walks could be on uneven surfaces. Days could be longer (including longer travel days with layovers). **Some of the trips could be at high altitudes.**

This would be the level for most of our longer distance domestic and Canadian tours, the minimum level for an overseas international tour. Tours which mention the ability to walk 3-5 city blocks **in a timely fashion** a couple of times a day fit into this category, as would most of our national park tours. You could find a flight of stairs without handrails. A tour with a seaplane or jeep ride, and the ability to climb into the plane/jeep, would be found in this category. Longer rail tours fit in this category.

E Energetic – A tour with an accent on opportunities for walking and other physical activities. Many overseas tours would fit in this category. Long plane flights, perhaps standing or walking longer distances. You might have to climb into a boat, carriage or train. If you need wheelchair assistance at the airport or other places, you should not consider a tour on this level.

C Challenging – Tours like these are designed with daily physical activities like hiking and other vigorous activities and can be great travel experiences, **but they are not typical of Sports Leisure Vacations trips.**
