At Sports Leisure Vacations, the COVID-19 has caused quite a lot of commotion. Trips have been postponed or cancelled, a Tour Preview Day has been pushed back, we've all had to work hard at quickly getting refunds from our vendors and passing them on to you. Over a million dollars worth.

It's a sad time. Sad because we spend a lot of our days here creating what we think are pretty special adventures, writing copy for a catalog, rounding up pictures, selling the trip to you, "working" it prior to departure, only (in this case) to have to undo everything. Some tour planners (Clayton comes to mind) lost most of their spring schedule. When you work that hard, and that long, to create something to share with others, and then don't have the opportunity, it's more than profits that are lost. There were some long faces around our place.

It is a "long, strange trip," this time we spend on planet earth. Some people's trips are longer and more complicated/interesting than others. Some people are accused by their friends of "always trippin'." But then, I was the guy who took 25 people to a marijuana dispensary on a mystery tour last year so they could learn about the pain med known as CBDs.

The only trippin' we've all been doing lately is the trip from the living room to the back porch. When you've spent 40 years of your life traveling, is amazing how bored you can become with your surroundings in just a few short weeks. It's exactly 5.2 miles from my house to the office and the grocery and drug stores are on the route. So is See's Candy, but they aren't considered an essential business. (Fine, try living the rest of your life without it and see how that works out.) Speaking of essential businesses, why is the donut store closed and the ice cream shop open? Answer me that one...

So the refunds for cancelled tours are out. and our crew here is down to two people a day. Within a few days of when you receive this newsletter, we will be doing all of our business remotely. They will take a day trip, or a short, close-to-home 3 day tour, just to make sure travel is the way they remembered it. Slowly, over a period of months, travelers will find their footing, and head back to grander adventures. (Did you know Music *Man*, starring **Hugh Jackman**, is featured on our Thanksgiving in New York tour? I told you grand adventures await.)

We have rescheduled our Spring Preview Day (see the front page for details), in an attempt to roll out our holiday tours for 2020. If the "all clear" isn't given by May23rd (our Preview Day date), we'll come up with a plan "C".

People vs. Profits

I want you to know we are not only focused on getting back on the road. We are focused on protecting our travelers, just as we always have. We have monitored this entire situation with the virus carefully, and we were among the first operators to cancel and reschedule tours. The COVID-19 virus is serious

business and there's no reason to put our staff or our travelers in danger.

In a few cases, we were able to reschedule tours and offer you the opportunity to roll over your deposits for later in the year (or 2021). Where we couldn't do that, refunds were made, over a million dollars worth of credit card refunds and checks. We are part of the California Seller of Travel Law, and so your money is protected. (This is a tough time for travel companies, be careful who you trust with your money.)

For your comments on our Facebook page on line, the notes you've sent and the comments you share on your phone calls. Thanks for caring. It matters. It's amazing how, right now, the smallest kindnesses are appreciated. Consider a thank you, or a small Starbucks gift card, or your favorite baked cookies to that grocery clerk who worked his or her butt off for the last several weeks. Or when you see someone in "scrubs" at the grocery store, thank them for being there for all of us. Maybe you leave a dollar in the tip jar at the drive through, even though you think this whole tipping thing has gotten out of hand. For a few words or a few dollars, or a combination of both, you can buy a LOT of karma. I suspect some of you are already aware of this. We are all in this together. Grandma, you may have to explain that to grandson. Do it.

Hope to see many of you at Spring Preview Day, if we are allowed to be in the same room together by then. There might even be these old-timey things called "baseball games" sometime this summer. You never know. Just one more time, thank you for your support. Wouldn't trade you all for the world. See you on the radio, new time 5pm Sundays.

Ed. Note: Becky's comments give me an opportunity to address something. When we reserve rooms at hotels, we are often given a rate lower than what is available to the general public. In return for those rates, the hotel, in the contract, will designate our room block as "run of house." It's a common hotel term meaning, "we can give you any rooms in the hotel" which meet agreed on standards and bedding. On rare occasion (Niagara Falls and Maui are two that come to mind), we reserve view rooms, because it's an important part of the experience. If you wish a room with a view in other cases, it is certainly possible, but it comes at a premium price.

Becky, your experience on several trips sorta makes my point. By luck of the draw, you got rooms with a view twice. Then the odds caught up with you and you got a limited view room. If you (or anyone reading along) would like to guarantee a room on a higher floor, a view, etc., inquire when you register for a trip and we will check into it for you. One last thought. "Run of House" refers to locations of rooms in the building. ALL **ROOMS** should be clean and comfortable, and meet your expectations. If it doesn't, Becky is right, we want to know.

He has also reminded me on several occasions that it doesn't matter how long you have something for how much you love it. I asked him what he meant and he said "well you've only known me for two years but you love me like it's been forever. Yes, my son is the coolest.

Questions about Cancellations and the Virus

Does Travel Insurance/Cancellation Protection Cover The Corona Virus?

The short answer is no. No insurance we are aware of includes pandemics in their coverage.

So How Can I Protect Myself?

Sports Leisure has an option most tour operators don't offer. Up until 60 days before departure on US and Canadian tours, you can cancel for any reason and receive a complete refund of all payment, less a \$20 administrative charge. Within 60 days of departure, there are no options, except...

A Special Cancellation Policy

We are offering a special option for those canceling out of fear of travel (catching the virus) who cancel within 60 days of departure. We will split the cancellation charges with you, in the form of a certificate for future travel. If the cancellation fee is \$600, \$300 would be included in your check/credit card refund, and \$300 would be given to you in the form of a Travel Certificate, good on any scheduled tour or cruise within one year.

What if Sports Leisure Cancels the Tour?

If we cancel the tour, you will receive a complete refund. Again, tours cancelled within 60 days of departure may have an airline voucher as part of the refund. The rest would be in the form used for payment. If you paid for your tour by credit card, for legal reasons, those refunds must be made to the card they were charged on.

Southwest Allows Two Free Checked Bags – When we Fly Southwest, Why Can't We Check Two instead of One?

This came up on a recent trip to Hawaii. Space in the car is the answer. Many of the cars/SUVs which transport you to/from the airport have limited storage space. We know we can accommodate one checked bag per person. We also know some of the cars will not accommodate two bags per person. How would we match the cars with the bags? (This is already a difficult process, dispatching the cars all over the Sacramento area.) Would it be fair for one person to be allowed two bags, when others got only one? Probably not. Make sense?

Calling the Hotel/Restaurant to Make Your Own Special **Arrangements**

Recently, we have had a couple of our hotel/restaurant partners advise us they had received calls from members of our group prior to our arrival. In the case of the hotel, the traveler wanted menus from the restaurant sent to her, a list of nearby places the hotel would take her to (the answer of "within two miles of the hotel" didn't work for her), she wanted to be away from the elevator (but not all the way at the end of the hall), also not next to anyone who is having a party or is

Whew. No wonder the confused hotel staff called our office. The client in question had called three times, and wanted a specific room number, a week in advance of her arrival. The hotel's comment to me, "You need to ask this traveler to stop calling our property."

One of our favorite San Francisco restaurants called. Seems one of our travelers didn't want any of the three choices we were offering and had gone online and

worked out her own choices from the menu and was calling the restaurant to make sure they knew what to fix for her. The restaurant called us after the traveler had a hard time understanding why what she wanted to do was possible, but wasn't something they could do for her. Their comment, "Please advise members of your group they cannot contact us directly to order custom meals." They made it clear if they continued to receive those calls they would decline our group next time. "Things like this have happened before," we were told.

Ouch. As a picky eater and hotel guest myself, I get it. But you need to have a little faith in your tour company. Make your requests when you register, and we will tell you if they are possible or not. Actions like the ones described above are very selfish. Why? You are promoting your interests ahead of the rest of the group, regardless of the impact on the group. Your fellow travelers.

Imagine sitting down to a meal on tour and having the person next to you get something you didn't know you had the option of having. (Because you didn't.) Or having someone in the group brag about how they just call all the places ahead of time to (try and) get special treatment.

If you travel as a member of a group, you have some great advantages. You can often see and do things individual travelers cannot. But there are limitations. You have to stay within the structure of the group.

If the "callers" described in this story sound like you, I'd be happy to speak with you about your needs and how we can accommodate you on tour without you privately contacting our partners. But I must tell you that contacting tour vendors on your own to make special arrangements is not an accepted practice. If you need that level of service, it's probably best if you travel independently.

As part of our commitment to helping you select the right tour for your interests and physical abilities, check out the Activity Meter for each tour to get a feel for how it matches your interests, energy and fitness. It's important to note that more than one level may apply to a tour. For example, some will enjoy a visit to a national park by spending time in the visitor's center and taking a seat with a view. Others might prefer to hike on a nature trail. Same destination, same tour, two different levels of activity.

The letter abbreviations for each departure can be found in the Table of Contents listing for the tour. Where you see two letters, that indicates the ability to add activities or do optional things which increase the amount of physical activity (standing, walking, climbing stairs, etc.). The meter is a guideline. It is impossible to predict every situation on tour, since conditions may change before or during a trip which require itinerary adjustments.

Leisurely - A tour that can be enjoyed by all. A minimal amount of required walking on city streets or generally level surfaces, with few stairs. A theater day trip might be an

Moderate – A tour with some walking activities, and standing/strolling at attractions and museums and possibly some stair climbing. A day trip to the ballpark or a short regional trip (Monterey, CA Coast) might be examples. A moderate trip could include air transportation and navigating through airports; and some high altitudes.

Active – A tour which includes longer walks (3-5 city blocks). Shorter walks could be on uneven surfaces. Days could be longer (including longer travel days with layovers). Some of the trip could be at high altitudes.

This would be the level for most of our longer distance domestic and Canadian tours, the minimum level for an overseas international tour. Tours which mention the ability to walk 3-5 city blocks in a timely fashion a couple of times a day fit into this category, as would most of our national park tours. You could find a flight of stairs without handrails. A tour with a seaplane or jeep ride, and the ability to climb into the plane/jeep, would be found in this category. Longer rail tours fit in this category.

Energetic - A tour with an accent on opportunities for walking and other physical activities. Many overseas tours would fit in this category. Long plane flights, perhaps standing or walking longer distances. You might have to climb into a zodiac boat if you are with Ramona. If you need wheelchair assistance at the airport or other places, you should not consider a tour on this level.

Challenging – Tours like these are designed with daily physical activities like hiking and other vigorous activities and can be great travel experiences, but they are not typical of Sports Leisure Vacations trips.
