What's Going and What's Not, An Update

As we work our way through the COVID-19 crisis, awaiting a vaccine or an instant test (or both) to make travelers safer, we are

starting to see some tours operate. No one knows what tomorrow brings, but if we keep moving forward, more trips will get on the road.

October

We have some day trips operating, but all longer trips have been cancelled.

November

Sedona is the one destination still on the board (to be fair, there were only three to start with). There will be day trips.

December

The Christmas Mystery Tour (2 departures-full), Christmas at the Ritz (full) and Christmas at the Apple Farm (space available, possibly no Hearst Castle) still scheduled in early December. There are a few seats on our Christmas Tour to Reno/ Virginia City over the holiday.

January 2021

The **Eagles & Owls** Festival has been cancelled, so the trip will not operate until 2022. **Key West** at the end of January is sold out. Fingers crossed.

What Determines if a Trip Will Operate

We will continue the process we started this year. About three months before departure, we will assess each trip to determine if the number of participants is high enough to proceed. Then we set about reconfirming the itinerary. Our rule of thumb is if 80% of the attractions and other pieces of the itinerary are in place, the trip will operate. If the damage to the itinerary is greater, we will either cancel the trip; or provide replacement attractions and give

you the chance to cancel without charge.

Cancellation charges are not waived within penalty periods unless the tour is cancelled. If you choose to cancel and the trip operates, you would pay cancellation penalties. If this is confusing or you have any questions, the office if open M-T-TH-F, 9am-3pm.

Already Decided Not to Travel?

If you have signed up for a trip and have already decided not to travel, please, as a courtesy, cancel your tour with us. Recently, we have noticed a number of folks waiting until the very last free cancellation day to bail. While there's nothing **technically** wrong with that, it makes our job even more difficult.

If we see a trip with 26 and we contact folks and end up with 16 (this actually just happened with the **Bodega Bay** trip – exact numbers), the trip must be cancelled. Then all those hotels and restaurants we talked to have to be called and everyone is disappointed. If you have a solid reason for waiting until the last minute, by all means, take advantage of that flexibility. Please remember there is a \$20 administrative fee on ANY cancellation made after you make your initial payment. This is, in part, to keep people from making 6 reservations and keeping 2 or 3. If you help us we can get back to making travel dreams come true a whole lot quicker.




